The Potato Park's biocultural protocol provides a model for developing effective community protocols, which implement the Nagoya Protocol, build capacity to negotiate with third parties, and build the foundations for equitable, sustainable and self-determined local economies. It is one of the few community protocols which is actually functioning in practice to guide the distribution of benefits.

Collective biocultural heritage is a

complex system of interdependent parts centred on the relationship between Indigenous Peoples and their natural environment. Its components include biological resources, from the genetic to the landscape level; and long standing traditions and practices guided by customary laws.
